Cumulative disadvantage

- The convergence of life course risk factors in late-life increase vulnerability to abuse among women of color.
- Barriers to wealth-building opportunities, wages, and workplace benefits, household responsibilities that restrict labor force participation by race and by gender converge and accumulate and lead to astonishingly high rates of poverty in their later years.

Wealth gap by race and gender

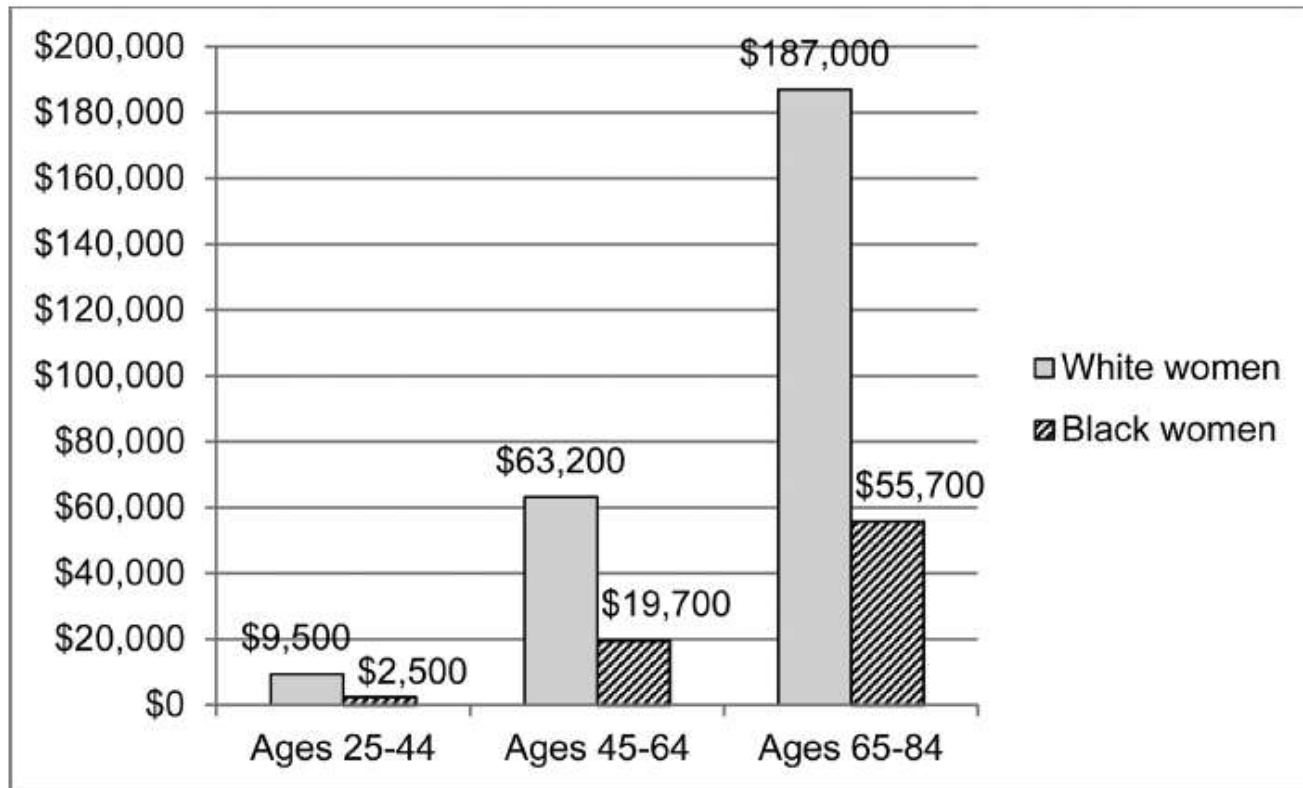


Figure 2. Median wealth of Black and White single women by age cohort (Survey of Consumer Finances [SCF 2013]). Authors' calculations of 2013 SCF.

Wealth gap by race/ethnicity

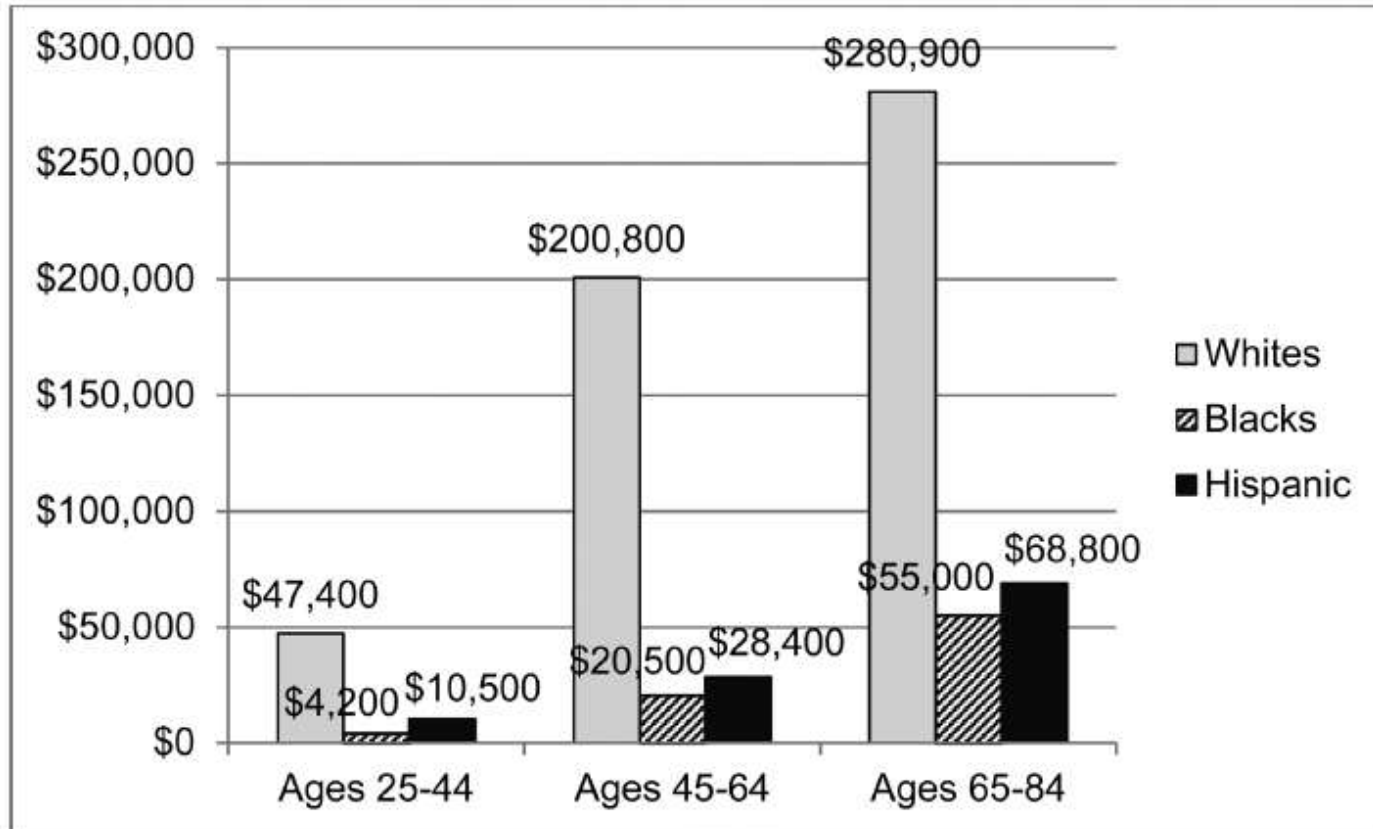
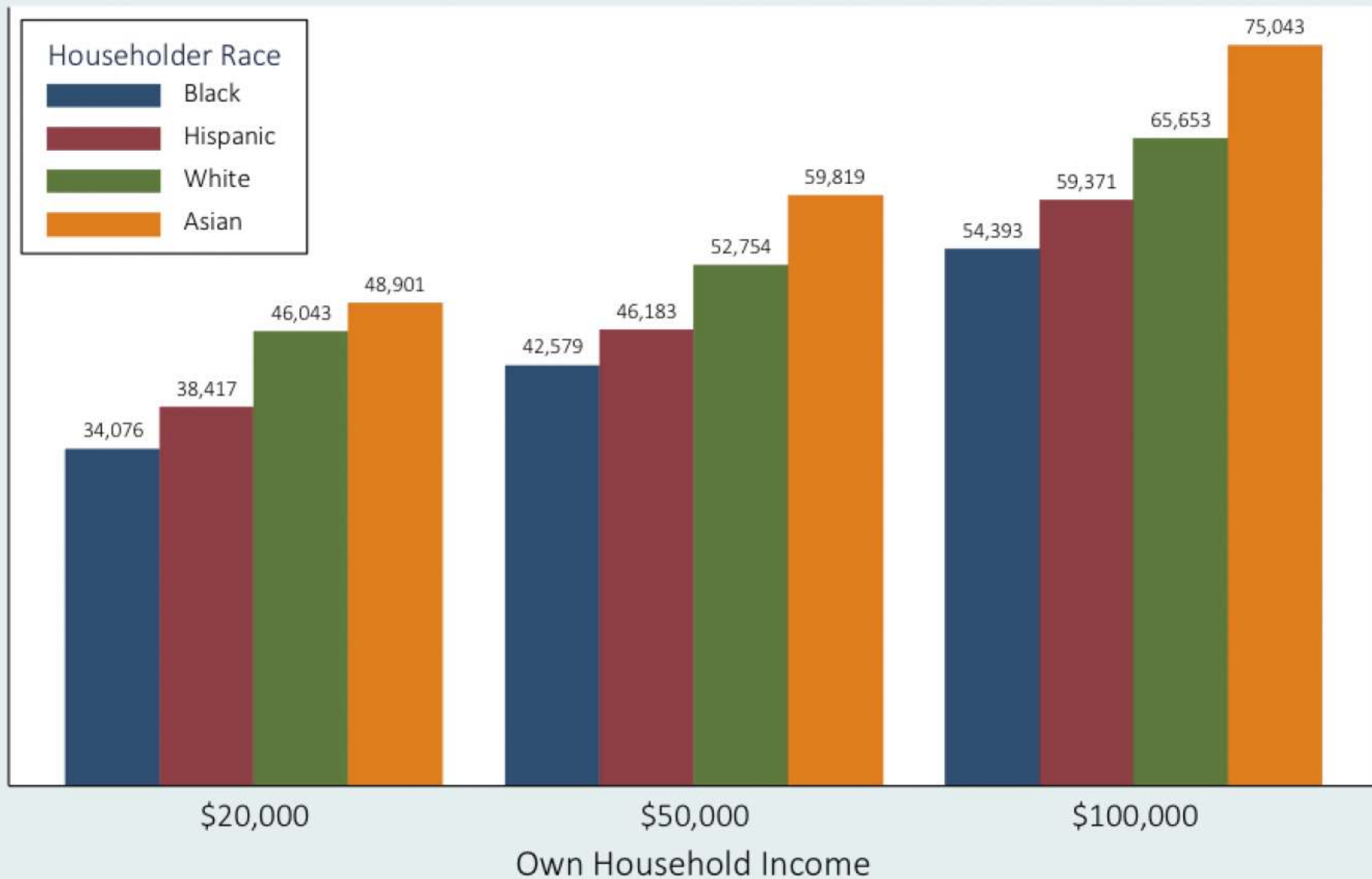


Figure 1. Median household wealth by race/ethnicity and age cohort (Survey of Consumer Finances [SCF 2013]). Authors' calculations of 2013 SCF.

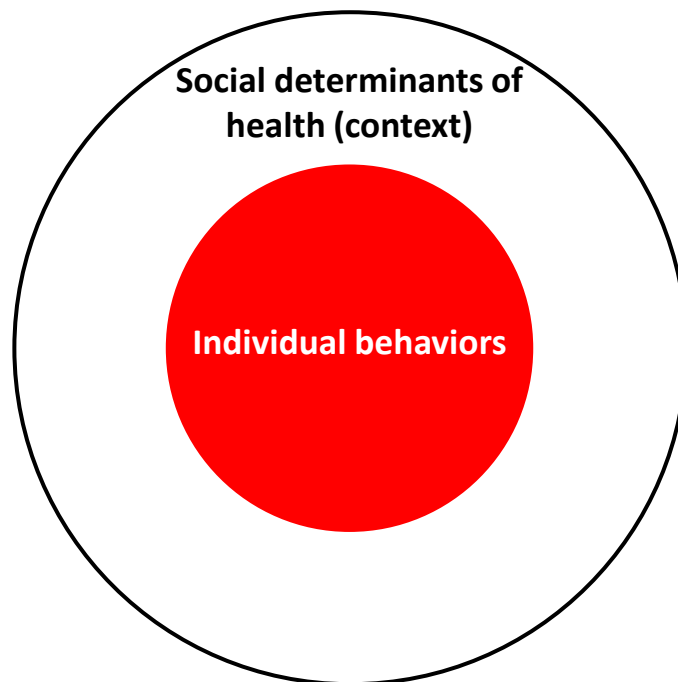
Social determinants of health

Housing, access to healthy food, transportation, public safety, parks, health care, social integration and support systems, political clout



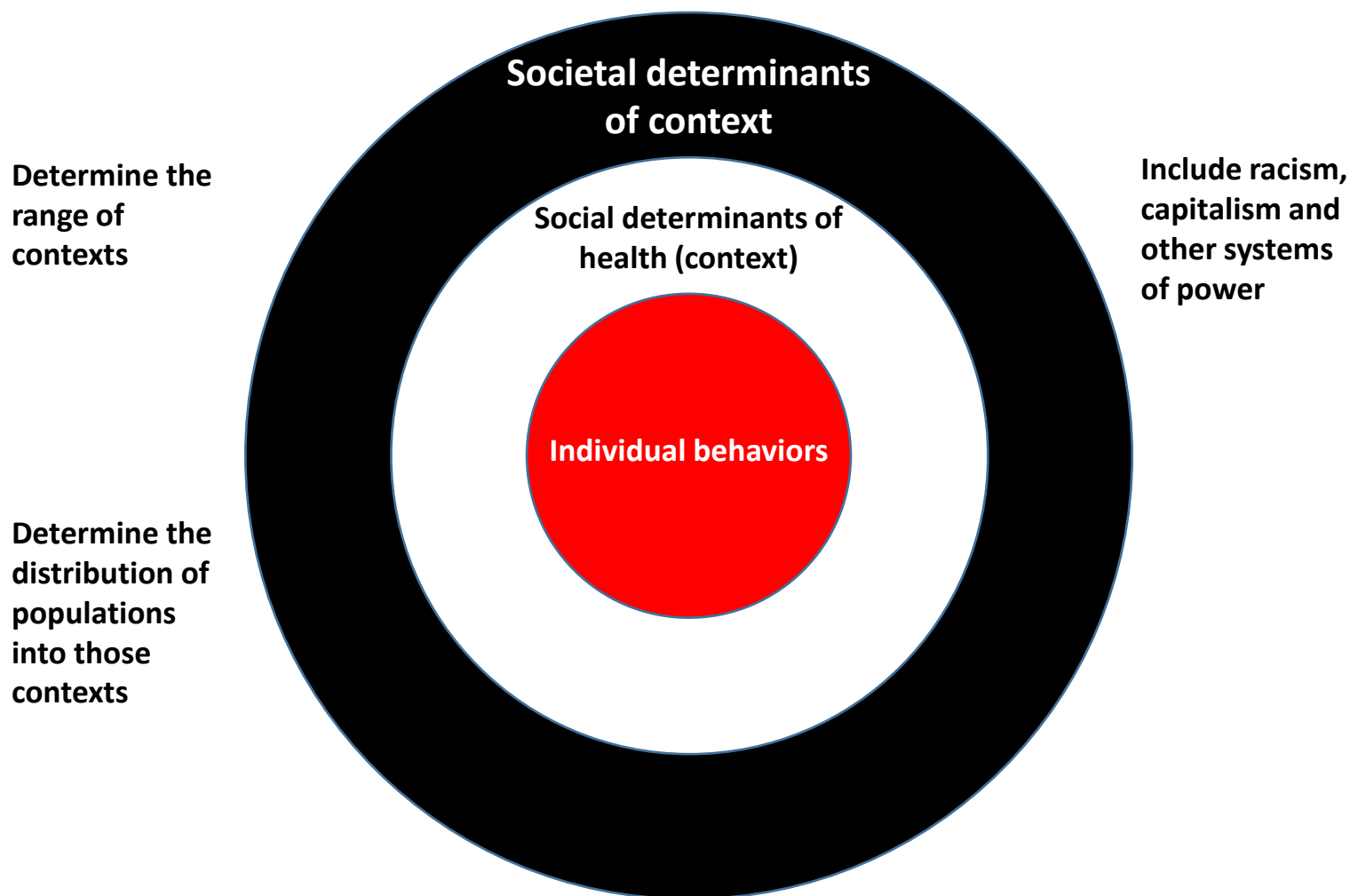
Hazards and toxic exposures
