Appointments to the Elder and Disability Justice Coordinating Council are made by the Director of the CA Department of Aging. The council's primary objective is to foster coordination and develop recommendations aimed at preventing and addressing abuse, neglect, exploitation, and fraud against older adults and adults with disabilities. This collaborative effort, in partnership with the Department of Justice, brings together leaders from various State agencies and stakeholder organizations. Elder justice holds a central position within California's Master Plan for Aging (MPA), introduced by Governor Gavin Newsom in 2021. Among the MPA initiatives, Initiative #93 specifically mandates the establishment of a coordinating council to enhance coordination and provide recommendations for combating elder abuse, neglect, exploitation, and fraud.

As the primary advocacy body for older Californians, the California Commission on Aging serves as a catalyst for addressing emerging challenges and opportunities faced by older adults.
